




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Southill Community Energy results to September 2023

- Headline result for the SCE is a surplus of £250k in the year compared to a surplus of £155k last year
 - Sales revenue up due to higher electricity price and favourable weather
 - Admin expenses up slightly due to higher activity but also some repairs needed which is to be expected as the facility ages
 - Interest continuing to fall
 - Includes S106 obligations of £45k donation (max)





Southill Community Energy results to September 2023



- Another year of strong cash generation
 - Generated £321k in the year
 - Paid out full commitment on Section 106 and 5% on members share interest
 - Also used to repay borrowings and the bond




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Solar production volumes 2023/24


- Metered generation was 4,358 MWh from 1st October 2022 to 30th September 2023
 - Production 9% above our P50 budget, with no significant availability issues recorded
 - Production down 4% on the previous year due to lower July and August production





Year-on-year our solar production remains above budget levels







- Our generation budget is determined by independent experts who assessed production volumes at 50% and 90% probability (confidence) levels
- Southill has beaten budget in each full year of production to date
- Each year Southill's capability to generate declines a little (a process known as degradation)

Revenue for 2022/23 up due to higher power and ROC values

- Southill receives income from five sources (see chart), of these:
 - Renewable Obligation Certificate (ROC) Buy-out income is very stable and index-linked
 - electricity sales prices determined in the market and are very volatile
- In 2022 we locked-in electricity prices of £72/MWh for period November 2022 to March 2025.
- ROC buyout prices rose by 11% RPI
- ROC recycle values were up
 - Demand levels bounced back
- Regulatory changes to embedded benefits reduce our income from these sources




Zero-carbon energy system:

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



Figure 1. Southill solar farm, displaying the different BMP habitats, and transect routes.

Butterflies and bumblebees - species






Figure 3. Invertebrate diversity at Southill Solar Farm between 2016 and 2023.

Butterflies and bumblebees - numbers






Figure 4. Invertebrate abundance at Southill Solar Farm between 2016 and 2023.

Breeding bird diversity






Figure 1. Bird diversity at Southill Solar Farm between 2016 and 2023.







































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SCE's community benefits



- In line with our articles Southill Community Energy has been funding the community by making payments totalling £245k under its s106 obligations since 2017:
 - £69,848 to Thomas Gifford Trust towards the new Community Centre
 - £65,000 to the Cotswold National Landscape (formerly Cotswold Conservation Board)
 - £110,500 to Sustainable Charlbury for redistribution towards low carbon projects through the Community Benefit Fund Programme
- Further payments in respect of SCE's 2022/23 surplus are:
 - £15,000 to Cotswold National Landscape
 - £30,000 to Sustainable Charlbury
- Contributions to Cotswold National Landscape and Sustainable Charlbury will continue on an annual basis, and within the direction of the s106, subject to available operational surpluses.

going low carbon locally

Community Benefit Fund Programme

- SusCha was registered as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation in 2018
- Objectives are to inspire, encourage and empower groups and individuals within the community to reduce their carbon emissions and to promote the improvement of environmental protection
- Designated as the body to receive and distribute surplus funds generated by SCE following update of s106 Agreement in 2019
- SCE first transferred funds to SusCha in March 2020 and the programme for distribution of grants began in April 2020

going low carbon locally

- Amount distributed since grant programme began in August 2020 = £64,657
- Income last year from SCE = £30,000
- Amount given out in grants 2023-24 = £24,195
- Budget for this year = £30,000
- Aiming for budget of £30,000 a year from SCE surpluses over the remaining life of the solar farm (subject to SCE financial performance)
